What I did and who I met at my BHA work experience

<u>Monday</u>

On Monday I had to work from home as Adam was at an event in Perth which went really well from what everyone said, whereas I completed various tasks on Racing2Learn which provided my information on different courses such as learning about the Racing Industry, Racing Staff and Careers, Racing Staff Development Programme and lots more where I completed the eLearning tasks and took he assessments to reach the end goal of printing out my certificate at the end of the courses.

<u>Tuesday</u>

Next it was Tuesday where I went into the office and met various members of the BHA staff. I was then introduced to Florence Cain, who works for the charity Racing to School where she introduced me to Racing Together which offer programmes such as Autism in Racing, the Ouzbeck pilot, Yorkshire Beacon, and Community Day. They opened my eyes to how the Racing Together Community Day sees over 75 racing employee teams volunteering in local communities nationwide. Soon after I spoke to Cathy O'Meara who is involved in the BHA Raceday teams, to which she informed me of how she works together and is in constant communication with the Clerk of Scales, Integrity, Judges, Race starters and Stewards. Overall, she guided me through step by step of how switched on and on the ball, you have to be to succeed in her work.

Wednesday

This was a very fascinating and in-depth learning day for me due to the fact of how I gained the knowledge of BHA ownership registration forms. The step-bystep guide of how owners should apply correctly for their application to be accepted and not rejected, such as not lying outright on the forms, in terms of being transparent on having businesses go bankrupt, associating with any criminal activity and so on.

Thanks to Isaac, Harry, and Tom, they guided me through their jobs in detail. They gave me a couple of tasks of updating jockey licenses on the spreadsheet and going through how the ownership operation works in terms of Partnerships, Sole Ownership, Syndicate and Racing Groups. Which is a relatively new concept to racing and something which I knew very little about.

This is when the racing club members acquire no ownership rights, or lease any interest in, any racehorses but may acquire no ownership rights to. Ultimately a completely fascinating experience to be a part of, to which I am very thankful to all that gave me the opportunity to shadow them during my time here.

<u>Thursday</u>

Sadly, the trains were not operational for me as there were strikes, meaning I had to work form home. In saying this I did have a couple of productive tasks such as editing the brochures and updating a couple of sections on the careersinracing training and job section, soon followed up by giving any advice and providing ways to improve on the careersinracing social media aspects, such as their Tik Tok and Instagram videos.

<u>Friday</u>

This was my last day at the BHA, and I managed to have a meeting with one of the members of the Handicapping team- Rachel Brierley Ambrose, where she informed me the length and pound system of their rating schemes, which a horse will have after three finishes. Which was followed up by a couple of tasks sent to me from Sean who runs the careesinracing social media presence-TikTok, Instagram, Twitter. Soon after that the end of the day loomed over me, and Adam and I had an overview of the week and discussions of the careersinracing content review.
